Social Security Tax Rate Increase

Attention: Your paychecks in 2013 are about to get smaller thanks to the Fiscal Cliff compromise deal that passed Congress on January 1, 2013.

Social Security Taxes paid by employees had been 6.2 percent of gross pay since 1990 through 2011 until Congress and President Obama agreed to temporarily reduce the tax from 6.2 percent to 4.2 percent as part of an economic stimulus package. The 2011 tax rate reduction was the first time Social Security taxes had been reduced since 1968. The two percent reduction in tax has been a welcome relief in these economic hard times, but the honeymoon is over. The Social Security tax holiday is behind us. The 2013 taxes are now back at their 6.2 percent rate. This means that those who pay Social Security taxes (i.e., almost everyone of us) will witness a drop in net pay effective January 2013.

It is normal for Federal and State Tax tables to adjust slightly at the beginning of each year which may also impact your net pay, but most likely the 2 percent increase in the Social Security tax rate will result in lower net pay for everyone.

This Social Security Tax Rate increase will impact your January paychecks and will continue until the Federal Government makes another change (either positive or negative).

Smoothies help introduce kids to a wide range of fruits, including bananas, strawberries, pears, peaches, blueberries, blackberries, raspberries, mango, pineapple, cherries, and mandarin oranges. "GAINS" Program



Nebo elementary school students are making academic "GAINS" with the help of a staff development program that utilizes arts integration. "Growing Arts in Nebo Schools" (GAINS) is a program designed to provide classroom teachers with grade specific tools that help them integrate instruction in art, dance, drama, and music into their daily instruction of language arts, math, science, and other curriculum. District specialists, Dr. Lisa Bean, Jeri Crosby, Holly Markgraff-Mayne, and Tom Wood, provide school grade level teams with instructional techniques and strategies using National Standards in the arts and State Core Art, Dance, Drama, and Music. These concepts are combined with additional core curriculum to reinforce and enhance student retention.

In Nebo schools, it is not unusual to see lessons that use dance and movement to increase vocabulary, music to develop writing skills and reading fluency, art to enhance mathematical spatial reasoning skills, or drama to build upon voice and character understanding. In addition to learning specific arts skills shared by

their classroom teacher, students have an opportunity to make meaningful connections to basic language arts, math, and other "tested" subjects. Studies show that an emotional feeling attached to a concept, embeds that concept deeply in a child's mind and enhances retention. The arts provide an exciting and engaging learning



experience for children. Positive side effects of arts integrated instruction for children may include improved attendance and more developed collaborative, creative, and social skills. Funding for this program is made possible in part by Art Works for Kids and Beverley Taylor Sorenson.



Safety is a Priority with Nebo School District

Safety is a priority of Nebo School District officials, school principals, teachers, and staff. With the tragedy at Sandy Hook Elementary in Connecticut, Nebo School District officials sent instructions to all principals and schools in the district on Friday, the morning of the tragedy, and again on the following Monday reminding schools of current district safety practices and procedures.

The U.S. Department of Education stated on Monday, December 17, 2012, "Schools are among the safest places for children and adolescents in our country, and, in fact, crime in schools has been trending downward for more than a decade. Accounts from Sandy Hook indicate that the school's heroic principal and her staff had safety measures in place and had practiced their emergency procedures. As a result, children's lives were saved and an even greater tragedy was averted."
