

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Superintendent's Message

Over the past several months, a number of people have talked to me about how much they liked the story I told at Opening Institute about my "grandmas." I have chosen to reprint it this month—with an important edit. Please read carefully to learn a powerful message that I failed to communicate effectively in my first telling of the story.

My Grandma Leah was a kindergarten teacher for 22 years. She adored her school children and her own family. Her grandchildren loved spending time with her and were blessed by sleepovers, pulling taffy, playing dress ups, going to the playground, kneading homemade bread, washing and drying dishes by hand, the Bean Museum, Tang, picking raspberries and apricots in the backyard, homemade raspberry or apricot jam on homemade bread, hanging laundry on the clothesline in the back yard, playing Billy Goats Gruff, making things out of foam egg cartons, penny trinkets for kids, and the annual Christmas party where she gave individually



wrapped Christmas gifts to the nearly 100 grandchildren packed into her tiny home!

Her grandchildren write, "Grandma Leah was always available for a spontaneous visit and welcomed us warmly. She liked having us there. She loved her family, and we all knew it! She had a home that was child friendly because she didn't worry about worldly possessions. She had grin wrinkles because she was always smiling!" It will be no surprise to you that one of Grandma Leah's favorite songs was:

Scatter sunshine all along your way; Cheer and bless and brighten Every passing day;

My Grandma Stevens had somewhat of a hard life. Her childhood and youth paralleled the First Great War and the Great Depression. She married a few years before the Second Great War and worked hard to help her husband get through college. They farmed together, and she devoted time to raising their four children. The sad reward for her support was a dissolved relationship and a divorce in 1950, a time when no one got divorced. One of her four children soon left for the Korean War, the others went to work to help provide

for the family. After waitressing and working in the school cafeteria, she eventually found fulltime work as a single mother. Grandma Steven's favorite song includes the words:

"I am happy today for the sunshine, for the skies of gray or blue... No cloud can cast a shadow over courage such as mine."

I am so thankful for the heritage of positive energy given to me by my Grandma Leah Stevens. Yes, Grandma Leah and Grandma Stevens are the same person.



Though she experienced difficult and trying times, she remained positive and optimistic about life and committed to sharing this energy with others. She personified the phrase: "The best legacy you could leave is a world that has been impacted and touched by your presence, your joy and your positive actions."

Kindergarten Enrollment

Kindergarten Enrollment at your neighborhood school from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on March 12, 2013, for the Spanish Fork area; March 13, 2013, for the Payson, Salem, Santaquin, and Goshen areas; and March 14, 2013, for the Springville and Mapleton areas. Future kindergarten students need to bring a birth certificate, a copy of their current immunization records, and a proof of residency.

Are your students school immunizations up-to-date? New this year is the opportunity to register and receive immunizations all the same day. The Utah County Health Department (UCHD) will be coming to the following schools to provide immunizations from 12:00 to 4:00 p.m. for all students in the above areas.

Larsen Elementary, March 12 from 12:00 to 4:00 p.m. Taylor Elementary, March 13 from 12:00 to 4:00 p.m. Cherry Creek Elementary, March 14 from 12:00 to 4:00 p.m.

Some immunizations that will be available include influenza, DTap/Tdap, HepA, HepB, polio, varicella, meningoccocal, MMR, and HPV.

Last week, Governor Gary R. Herbert recognized the Nebo School Board of Education for its work in advancing its own collective knowledge and skills as the lead policy organization in the district. The Master Boards Award program was conceived by leaders of the Utah School Boards Association who wanted to help local school board members understand the complexities of issues they face, including school finance, legislation, ethics, policy, and board meeting rules and conduct, among many other topics.
