# **Message from the Superintendent**

Welcome back from the holidays. I hope everyone had wonderful Christmas and New Year's celebrations.

A few weeks ago, I was visiting a school and noticed a faculty bulletin board with the heading "Lessons from the Mouse" and the following quote: "Never Let Backstage Come Onstage." These were very intriguing statements to me, so I dug a little deeper into Dennis Snow's book "Lessons from the Mouse."

Two things stood out to me as I read the initial chapter:

- 1. Snow teaches that "onstage" is where the "show takes place," where cast members and employees have "an opportunity to impress the guests." We are obviously "onstage" when school is in session, the bus is rolling, students are in the hallways, we are at an event, etc. However, in today's education climate, it seems we are always "onstage." People frequently make judgments about our district, our schools, our coworkers, and the experience their children are having based on things they hear in grocery stores, family gatherings, sporting events, church hallways, Facebook, Twitter, etc.
- Our organization is not perfect. I'm not a
  perfect leader. In fact, no employee in the
  district is perfect in their decisions or in
  doing their job. Dennis Snow says,
  "There's no such thing as a perfect boss or
  a perfect company. If you're looking for
  either one, you're doomed to a life of
  disappointment."

This recognition of imperfection does not mean we settle for mediocrity or substandard

performance in ourselves or our district. It does mean that we recognize the good work we do, while also recognizing that there is always room for improvement. As Lexus, the automaker, said for years, "We are in the 'Relentless Pursuit of Perfection.'"

This lack of perfection, coupled with our constant "onstage" presence, means that we have to be very careful about how and where we talk about the shortcomings of others, our schools, and our district.

Jamie Vollmer suggests, "Teachers, [education support] professionals, support staff, administrators, and board members must stop bad-mouthing one another and their schools in public. This destructive behavior... undermines the reputation of the speaker while simultaneously grinding down the public's opinion of their local schools."

Vollmer then encourages us all to make it a practice to, "Share something positive [about our schools] within our social networks. Soon, with almost no effort, the entire community is enlivened with good news about their schools, and everyone is energized in the process."

Admittedly we are not Disney World. We don't have rides, costumed characters, treats, parades, etc. to support a declaration of "The Happiest Place on Earth!" However, I have always felt that schools really can be some of the happiest places on earth for students and employees. The people we work with and the students we serve make working in education, and especially in Nebo District, an amazing job. I thank each of you for the opportunity I have to work alongside such amazing "cast members."

## Take Trick & Treachery Out of Walking

Follow these tips and take some of the trick and treachery out of walking outside during the winter months.

- Plan ahead.
- Slow down.
- Keep your center of gravity over your knees by bending your knees a little
- Walk flat-footed and take smaller steps.
- Avoid quick and sharp turns.
- Don't pivot on one foot.
- Walk with your hands out of your pockets. This will assist you in maintaining your balance.
- Wear Appropriate Footwear.

where two different surfaces meet. Traction levels can change significantly when stepping from one type of surface



to another. For example, entrances at many buildings have walk-off mats which transition into a tile floor. Stepping from carpet to tile with moisture on the sole of a shoe/boot can significantly change the friction level and result in a fall accident.

- Walk around, not over, snow piles.
- Warn/remind others to be cautious.
   Our heads are not always in the game, so do a coworker, a friend, or a family member a favor by reminding them to follow these tips.

- Engage principal, staff, and parents on issues and solutions. Seeking opinions and input from others is part of a meaningful process when issues arise. And, it opens the door for two-way communication.
- Be visible. Be seen in classrooms, participate in school and community activities and events, and meet regularly with staff and parents. Nothing beats face-to-face interaction.



◆ Set the tone for transparency. Operations and processes should become demystified and transparent to your school's internal and external stakeholders. This again builds trust. (Source: NSPRA's resource files)

# **Positive PR Tips**

Sometimes innocent comments can take on negative connotations when people speak before considering the impact of their words. Encourage your staff to look for positive ways to communicate basic information. For example:

- "The school office is open until 4 o'clock," instead of "The school office closes promptly at 4 o'clock."
- "We'll be happy to give you those records as soon as we have a signed release form," instead of "We can't give you anything unless we have a signed release form."

"I know Mrs. Jones (principal) would like to talk with you. But right now she's attending to an urgent matter. I'll let her know you called, and she'll call you back today, as soon as she can, ""instead of "Mrs. Jones is too busy to talk to you. I'll ask her to call you."

Appreciate the power of "Yes." Educators should always look for ways to help our "customers" and be positive! When someone has a request (as long as it's reasonable), they should tell the person they can do it, and be sure to follow up, and do what they promised. (Source: NSPRA's resource files)
