Be an Encourager

Welcome back from Christmas break! I hope you each had a wonderful holiday. As we begin this New Year, I invite each of us to make a commitment to inspire and nurture our own and others' Red Rubber Ball by being "an Encourager" this coming year.

"In a world full of critics we need encouragers in our lives. They say that you become who you spend the most time with, so find someone who

pushes you to exceed your expectations, to reach for the stars, and work towards your dreams.
