Thinking of retiring at the end of 2017-18?

With the introduction of the new Early Retirement Incentive Plans, we recognize that many of our outstanding employees will be contemplating retirement at the end of this school year. We will be sad to see these good friends and dedicated coworkers leave our ranks and are so appreciative of their service to students.

In order to find the best possible candidates for open positions in the current competitive job market, it is important for supervisors to begin hiring new employees as soon as possible. Therefore, we are once again offering an Early Retirement Notice Incentive to those who have their retirement approved by the Board of Education before mid-February. The details are as follows:

- Any employee who is eligible for and retires from Utah Retirement System (URS) by June 30, 2018, can submit the final paperwork to the District by:
 - November 3, 2017, to receive \$1,000 in their November 30 paycheck, or
 - ♦ December 8, 2017, to receive \$1,000 in their December 31 paycheck, or
 - January 5, 2018, to receive \$1,000 in their January 31 paycheck, or
 - ♦ February 2, 2018, to receive \$500 in their February 28 paycheck.
- ◆ The final application deadline for this Early Retirement Notice Incentive is February 2, 2018.



This incentive is a one-time option for those who will retire at the end of the 2017-2018 school year. Interested employees who will be retirement eligible and would like to learn more about this option and their individual benefits may schedule an appointment with Robert Fleming at 801-354-7414. Retirement eligible employees will be given first priority for appointments.

A representative from Utah Retirement Systems will present basic retirement information for all employees on Tuesday, October 17, at 4:00 p.m. in the Nebo District office boardroom. Employees who would like to learn more about their retirement benefits are encouraged to attend.

Nebo School District Seeks Public Input

Nebo School District is in the initial planning process for a Bond Election to be held next year on November 6, 2018. Bonding is the primary method school districts use to construct new schools and meet other facility needs. Bond money cannot be used for salaries and benefits.

Based on previous community feedback of wanting to move to the middle school model, Nebo School District plans to ask patrons to approve a \$298 million dollar bond in November 2018. This tax-rate-neutral bond, which means no tax rate increase, will be used for:

- Building three new middle schools for students in sixth and seventh grade. These middle schools will be located within the boundaries of Salem Hills High, Springville High, and Maple Mountain High. As the new middle schools are completed, Mt. Nebo Junior High and Diamond Fork Junior High will become middle schools;
- Rebuilding Payson High, Spanish Fork High, and Springville High; and
- Making improvements to existing buildings and sites. It is estimated that approximately \$10 million dollars of bond funds will be focused on upgrades and improvements.

The Nebo School Board's decision on which projects to include will rely on public input and recommendations from parent committees.

- The purpose of this survey is to seek public input regarding facility needs in Nebo District.
- Public input will help determine priorities on how to best spend approximately \$10 million dollars intended for facility improvements.
- Parent committees will make recommendations to the Board regarding school facility priorities.

In accordance with state law, the Nebo School Board will finalize all plans prior to the 2018 Bond Election so the voting public will know the specific plans before voting. 

Encourage teachers to list the following information about themselves on their teacher webpages or class newsletters, or put it in a flyer that can be distributed at parent conferences.

- Advanced degrees.
- Years of experience.

- Continued training and/or professional development.
- Educational honors.
- One or two sentences about family and/ or background.
- One fact parents might find interesting.
- ♦ A personal note: "Why I love teaching."

Another suggestion to help teachers showcase the fact that they're "highly qualified" educators: have them display their diplomas prominently in their classrooms.

You can take added steps by giving teachers business cards that list their degrees and placing a group photo of faculty in the school lobby with a list of all degrees.
