After making a bouquet for our teacher, Dad would ask, "What teacher in the school does not have leaves for their classroom?" We would then proceed to make additional bouquets for any teacher that was not counted among ours. Dad knew, that with nine children, all of the employees in the school could

eventually impact one of his own. He chose not to leave anyone out of the fall ritual. No matter where one went in the school, the front office, the lunch room, the library and in every classroom, there was a special arrangement of fall leaves on full display.

My Dad treasured the process and outcomes of education and recognized the vital role that teachers and school employees would have with each of his nine children. My father's unique way of showing thanks to the "crew" of employees at Manti Elementary had a profound effect upon me. His example, and my own participation in this annual tradition,

instilled in me a respect for education and those who dedicate their life's work to it.

In the book, "Teach Like A Pirate," there is a chapter entitled, "Finding a Crew." It states, "All pirates travel with a crew; you can't sail, navigate, and fight battles all on your own. One of the most rewarding parts of teaching is the personal and professional relationships we develop on our voyage."

My voyage in public education is now in its twenty eighth year. I have found hidden treasure in the wo-

ven fabric of personalities that make up a faculty and staff. I have been fortunate to have treasured relationships with so many amazing people. I have worked with many selfless, hard-working crews! Many of you spend more waking hours at school than you do at home!

It truly "takes a crew" to manage a school. Each day as you preform your job, you are creating a Treasure Island where there is a never-ending supply of loot for the treasure seeking students.

As the HR director, I see a continual movement of the "crew." For myriads of reasons people come and go; but this I know, no matter the task you are hired to do, we could not do any part of it without you!!

# Make parent meetings about student performance as pain-free as possible

Addressing student performance issues poses serious challenges for principals and teachers. Here are some tips for making discussion of student performance as pain-free as possible.

- ◆ Schedule meetings at times that are convenient to parents. Don't give them a reason to be upset before they even come to your school.
- ◆ Be sure to thank them for coming and for their willingness to meet and talk about their children's performance.
- Eliminate any interruptions when meeting to discuss a serious topic such as student performance.
- Avoid small talk during the meeting. You want parents to feel like you take their children's success seriously.
- ◆ Let parents know early on that students are having problems.
- ◆ List student strengths and explain how they can be used to improve on problem areas.

- Highlight specific areas where improvement is needed. Be explicit about what it will take to improve.
- List key assignments where students can improve grades.
- Admit mistakes when appropriate.
- Listen carefully to parent concerns and complaints. Provide specifics about how concerns can be addressed and give timelines.
- Try not to display frustration, defensiveness or insecurities when dealing with upset parents.
   Keep the focus on problem-solving by avoiding judgment statements.
- ◆ End the discussion with a plan for action. What steps will be taken by teachers and the school? Are there specific things parents can do?

## Retiring at the end of the 2015-2016 school year?

Many of our outstanding employees may be contemplating retirement at the end of this school year. We will be sad to see these good friends and dedicated coworkers leave our ranks and are appreciative of their service to students.

In order to find the best possible candidates in today's current competitive job market, it will be important for supervisors to begin hiring new employees as soon as possible. Therefore, we are offering a \$1,000 Early Retirement Notice Incentive to those who have their retirement approved by the Board of Education before mid-January. The details are as follows:

- Any employee who is eligible for and retires from Utah Retirement System (URS) by June 30, 2016, can
  - Submit final paperwork to the District by November 6, 2015, to receive \$1,000 in their November 30 paycheck, or
  - Submit final paperwork to the District by December 4, 2015, to receive \$1,000 in their December 31 paycheck, or
  - Submit final paperwork to the District by January 8, 2016, to receive \$1,000 in their January 29 paycheck.
- The final application deadline for this Early Retirement Notice Incentive is January 8, 2016.

This incentive is a one-time option for those who will retire at the end of this school year. Interested employees who are already retirement eligible and would like to learn more about this option and their individual benefits may schedule an appointment with Ken Van Ausdal or Sandra Jarvis at 801-354-7400. Employees that are retirement eligible will be given first priority.

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
