

Energy Program Incentive

We want to thank you for your support and efforts over the past 18 months in making the energy program a priority in your buildings. Over the last year we have applied for rebate money through Questar Gas and Rocky Mountain Power. These rebates are a result of materials and equipment that have been installed that exceed the minimum requirement for energy code. Not only will the materials and equipment give us a rebate, but they will increase the efficiency of our buildings.

One of the biggest energy issues that we still face as a district is getting computer labs shutdown on a daily basis. There are over 10,000 computers in our school district; currently approximately 50% of these are being shutdown daily. With the support of the district administration, we have put together a challenge in hopes of getting students and teachers more involved in turning off computer labs.

Starting December 1 for an 11 week period (ending February 14th), we will be auditing computer labs and class-rooms on a weekly basis. For each week your building achieves a 90% shutdown you will receive credit for that week. At the end of the 11 week period, if your school was compliant, you will receive the full amount of money.

| School | Amount Per Audit (If compliant) | Total After 10 Audits |
|-------------|------------------------------------|--------------------------|
| Elementary* | \$100 | \$1,000 |
| Junior High | \$150 | \$1,500 |
| High School | \$200 | \$2,000 |

Rules for Passing an Audit:

-90% of computer labs shutdown. We will randomly audit 10% of the classrooms in each building.


-Our goal is not to have this assignment placed on the custodial staff, but to get students and teachers in the habit of turning labs off daily.

- -We will leave an audit form or send you an email after each audit letting you and your staff know how they performed for the week.
- -This will take place over an 11 week period starting December 1st. With Christmas Break being a two week holiday, there will only be one audit performed for a total of 10 audits over 11 weeks.

*Landmark, Legacy, and ALC fall in this category.
