

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"Let it Shine" at Christmastime

We all remember the positive energy and enthusiasm demonstrated by Murray Banks as he presented on our "Let it Shine" theme back in August. We also remember that he talked about how much easier it is to have positive energy in August and September than it is as the year progresses. As Murray and I travelled to and from the airport, I witnessed firsthand two principles he observes for maintaining positive energy at all times.

First, Murray puts family first. He adores his dear wife, his two sons and their wives. His career is spent travelling the world, but it is very apparent that home is where his heart is. He is fully committed to their success and happiness. Murray's commitment to family extended to his interest in my family. We talked about our families extensively in our time together. He was excited to meet my wife, mom, sister, and nieces. He was touched that I would speak about my grandmothers. Murray's actions reminded me that family is a main source of positive energy.

Second, Murray serves others. For much of the ride back to the airport, he was on the phone trying to help a young man with limited resources join his cross country ski school. I learned that Murray commits his weekends and his personal resources to train young people as alpine skiers. I also learned that Murray and his wife raise a garden so they can share produce with those who are in need. Based on my observations, I would guess that these are just two examples of the service that Murray and his family give to others.

Neither of these two principles is earthshattering. In fact, we probably observe a level of family commitment and service to others in our area that is unparalleled in other parts of the country. However, it strikes me that these two messages from the life of Murray Banks may be even more important to our ability to "Let it Shine" consistently than the message he shared on the stage.

I know that not everyone has ideal family circumstances. We also have varying opportunities to serve. We are fortunate in education that we work each day in a family environment serving others, particularly those least able to serve themselves, children. Hopefully these family-like relationships and service opportunities at work help us all to remain renewed with positive energy.

I am so thankful for Christmastime when family and service to others take center stage. What a wonderful season to "Let it Shine!"

Nebo's Junior High Best Project

Over the last two years elementary and junior high teachers have been participating in the BEST Project. They have learned strategies to manage "Tough Kids" in their classrooms. In the 2011-2012 school year, teachers that participated saw at least a 50 percent drop in student behaviors such as talking out in class, getting out of their seat, and being off task. This year the Behavior Enhancement Support Team (BEST) is at it again, helping teachers manage students in their classrooms through Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS).

Communications—Tips to keep meetings short and Productive

According to Industry Week, meetings no longer than 30 minutes force... **Preparation**. People will have to do critical thinking beforehand. **Focus**. There won't be time to get off on a tangent, and the clock, not the leader, is the "bad guy". **Action**. With limited time, decisions must be made without prolonged, unnecessary discussion.

Following are some tips to help:

Prepare an agenda and email it to attendees well in advance. Set a time limit of 30 minutes total and designate a time for each item. Put the most important items first on the agenda. Start the meeting promptly and don't "backtrack" for latecomers. State that you will observe the time limits, and stick to them. Designate a timekeeper. Ask for a volunteer. Have a "parking lot" on a flip chart to list unrelated ideas that can be addressed later.
