Retiring at the end of 2018-19?

Nebo is offering an Early Retirement Notice Incentive to those who have their retirement approved by the Board of Education before mid-February. The details are as follows:

- Any employee who is eligible for and retires from the Utah Retirement System (URS) by June 30, 2019, can submit the final paperwork to the district by:
 - February 1, 2019, to receive \$500 in their February 28 paycheck.
- The final application deadline for this Early Retirement Notice Incentive is February 1, 2019.

This incentive is a one-time option for those who will retire at the end of the 2018-2019 school year.

Road to Wellness Compliance is due by: February 1, 2019.


