BE THE MAGIC DO SOMETHING ABOUT IT

For anyone who has been to a Disney park, you probably wish that Lesson 9 from "the Mouse" was "Find out what ticks your customers off and stop doing it!" For me that would mean reduced admission, much shorter lines, reasonably priced food, more benches, more grass, and more shade. However, Disney clearly knows that their core purpose is to give visitors a great experience... while still being profitable, so the Lesson is "Find out what ticks your customers off — and do something about it." This means we will continue to have a wonderful time while visiting Disneyland, knowing that: the lines will be long, but FastPass and themed waiting areas make it more bearable; there are plenty of places to sit, relax, and cool off...inside; it will not be cheap, but the experience will be worth it.

When we apply this lesson to our own situation, we are then grateful that the message isn't "*stop doing it!*" Like Disney, it is not possible for us to "stop" doing everything that irritates anyone. We are clear in our purpose to give students a great academic experience in wonderful learning environments. We are all professionals who know what we can do within our own responsibilities to make this happen for kids.

We can also follow Disney's example to find things that we can "do something about" to help a student, parent, community member, or fellow employee have a better experience in Nebo. For example:

 Energy specialists dropped classroom temperature set points this past fall after hearing concerns that rooms were too hot the year before.

- Maintenance installed 15-minute parking signs at the District Office to help keep parking spaces free.
- Teachers ask and answer the four essential questions: helping them better meet the needs of all students.
- Secondary math teachers created an assignment to guide their students, and parents, through the online math resources.

All of these example show where employees took initiative to "do something about" an issue that was "ticking customers off." Because of our outstanding employees, there are surely hundreds of other examples just like these throughout our district. Thank you for taking initiative to make things better for those around you!

Technology Tips:

Did you know that the **Employee Service Portal** can give you important information in regards to your job? Here are a few of the items you can view, request, and update:

- 1. Leave: Request leave, view past leave, and check leave balances.
- 2.**Payroll:** View monthly pay information, view/print W-2's, and view a summary of pay information.
- 3. Access the Nebo School District **Employee Directory**. This will give you an employee's location and email address.
- 4. Detailed list of your current Payroll Deductions.
- 5. Employee forms maternity leave request, leave request instructions, W-4 instructions, and transfer request forms.
- 6. Account information (located in upper right corner) change/update username, password, and email address that is used for Employee Service Portal.

If you have not set up an account as of yet, go to http://www.nebo.edu/employees/finweb for help. If you have already set up an account and are having trouble logging in, contact Human Resources for your username.

Legislature at a Glance

Generally speaking, public education - particularly the lowest funded districts - were positively impacted this legislative session. Public education is always somewhat frustrated by the large number of new laws that need to be followed. However, many of these new bills make small changes to existing laws, many are positive for public schools, and the number of laws with negative impact were kept to a minimum this session.

The biggest celebrations for public schools are the 4.0% increase on the WPU (which is the money used for salaries, steps/lanes, insurance, and other District needs) and funding for new students. Another huge celebration for several districts, including Nebo, was the passing of Senate Bill 97 Substitute 3 – Property Tax Equalization. This should bring large increases in leeway funding (which can be used to help with class size, technology, personnel, and other District needs) and capital funding (which can be used for facilities, property, equipment, etc.). Discussions on how to best use these new funds to benefit students, employees, and the community are already beginning.
