#### We Learned Lotz from a Zotz!

Last fall, no one could have ever known how critical it would be for all of us to "Discover the Power Within" this school year. You are all remarkable in the work you have done this year to support each other and to support students. Thank you for your epic and significant efforts!

We started the year with the message: You Can **Learn Lotz from a Zotz!** including the belief that "each of us has a power hidden within, something that can get us through any kind of adversity. That power is resilience" ("The Resilience Breakthrough," Christian Moore). We have likely experienced the need for more relational, street, resource, and rock bottom resilience this year than we ever have as an education community.

We also learned that the center of a Zotz is what makes it unique, special, even powerful, with the very obvious and very simple explanation that the O-T in the middle gives the Zotz its power. Think of how much you have exercised Optimism, Oneness, Originality, Thankfulness, Trust, Teamwork, Tenacity, and Talent as you have had unparalleled Opportunity to give 100%. We have been called upon to deeply manifest our character, which:

"may be manifested in the great moments, but it is made in the small ones . . . Character is tested, revealed, and further developed by the decisions we make in the most challenging times. We have to know what is right, and we have to choose to do it . . . outwardly . . . Character is a blend of inner courage,

wisdom, and a sense of duty to yourself, to others, and to something greater than you." ("Uncommon," Tony Dungy, p. 6-8)

Finally, we began the year with a story that helped us remember to apply these principles in our personal lives and in our organization. Some of those words seem even more significant and bring me even greater pride in our employees, given our current circumstances.


The students down south in the county of U Gets lots of great schooling from each one of you But this doesn't happen by chance, it does not! It comes from the lessons we learned from the Zotz!

## **Wellness Today**

During a crisis like the COVID-19 virus, it's important to take steps to stay physically healthy. But maintaining good mental health is also important.

#### **Tips for Maintaining Good Mental Health:**

- ◆ Limit media. Reading all articles related to the crisis will only cause more stress. Try setting a specific time, such as once every other day, to read updates, and do so with the idea that it will help you know how to prepare, not tell you how much to panic.
- ◆ Do some good. As you are able, help those around you.
- ◆ As much as you are able, stick to your normal routine. Or, create a new routine and adapt to following it.
- Reduce stress by having a preparedness plan.
- Connect with others through calls, video calls, etc.
- Practice good health habits such as exercising, meditating, sleep-ing enough, and eating well.
- Do things you enjoy or use this time to explore other interests.

#### Tips for Helping Your Children During a Crisis:

During this time when the world is experiencing a crisis, you can be the source of comfort your children need.

Everyone reacts to crisis and stress differently. Below are some reactions to watch for that may indicate your children need help through a crisis.

#### **Reactions to Watch For:**

- Acting out or exhibiting more irritability
- Withdrawing or demanding more attention than usual
- Crying more than usual and at the slightest provocation
- Experiencing unexplainable aches and pains
- ◆ Eating unhealthily
- Showing a change in sleep patterns

Whether your children are reacting to the current crisis or to another crisis in their world, the following tips can help you better support your children.

#### Tips to Help:

- ◆ Talk with your children about the crisis. Allow them to ask questions and then answer them simply and in a way they can understand.
- Talk with your children about their feelings. Are they feeling stressed? Worried? Listen to what they say, without judging. If talking doesn't seem to help, encourage them to draw or write about their feelings.
- ◆ Tell your children that their safety is important to you. Even though they are safe, let them know it's ok for them to feel scared or worried.
- ◆ Take care of yourself. In order to help your children, you need to help yourself. Practice good health habits and exhibit healthy ways to handle stressful situations. Your children can look to you to know how to cope with crises.
- Offer more attention to your children, such as giving back rubs, cooking comfort food or your children's favorite food, and giving more hugs.
- ◆ Spend more time together as a family.
