Ridley, who's been a foreign correspondent, a zoologist, an economist, and a financier, brings a broad perspective to his sunny outlook. "People say I'm bonkers to claim the world will go on getting better, yet I can't stop myself," he states. Read on to see how Ridley makes his case. Brilliant or bonkers? You decide.

- 1. We're better off now Compared with 50 years ago, the average human now earns nearly three times as much money (corrected for inflation), eats one third more calories, buries two thirds fewer children, and can expect to live one third longer. In fact, it's hard to find any region of the world that's worse off now than it was then, even though the global population has more than doubled over that period.
- 2. The good old days weren't Some people argue that in the past there was a simplicity, tranquility, sociability, and spirituality that's now been lost. This rose-tinted nostalgia is generally confined to the wealthy. It's easier to wax elegiac for the life of a pioneer when you don't have to use an outhouse. The biggest-ever experiment in back-to-the-land hippie lifestyle is now known as the Dark Ages.
- 3. We are the luckiest generation This generation has experienced more peace, freedom, leisure time, education, medicine, and travel than any in history. Yet it laps up gloom at every opportunity. Consumers do not celebrate their wonderful field of choice and, according to psychologists, say they are "overwhelmed." When I go to my local superstore, I do not see people driven to misery by the impossibility of choice. I see people choosing.
- **4. Optimists are right** For 200 years, pessimists have had all the headlines—even though optimists have far more often been right. There is immense vested interest in pessimism. No charity ever raised money by saying things are getting better. No journalist ever got the front page writing a story about how disaster was now less likely. Pressure groups and their customers in the media search even the most cheerful statistics for glimmers of doom. Don't be browbeaten—dare to be an optimist!

Nebo's BEST (Behavior Enhancement Support Team) Project

This year a number of teachers have been involved in the Nebo BEST (Behavior Enhancement Support Team) Project. Amidst the push for becoming better teachers of academic subjects, teachers need to become more proficient "Classroom Managers."

Marzano and others have shown that the most effective method of improving behavior is what teachers do and how they do it, consistently, over time, with fidelity. The second component

in the BEST Project is implementing 2-5 minute daily social skills lessons.

Teachers know that students excel when they are given explicit instruction. This holds true when teachers are discussing both academics and social skills.

The final component of this project is to give teachers tools to help manage whole class and/ or individual behaviors. At least twice a month a new technique is sent out to the teachers involved in this project.

Neeley Kay, special education teacher, said, "The BEST project has had great feedback from those teachers who have consistently implemented these daily lessons. It has been exciting to see the positive changes in the classrooms where positive behavior interventions are being implemented."

Exciting Opportunities for Nebo Students

Early College Advanced Learning Center (ECALC) is an advanced learning center for all Nebo students in grades 11 and 12. ECALC will be located at the current location of the Nebo Learning Center, 570 South Main Street, Springville. ECALC will host classes over a wide variety of interests including pre-nursing, medical forensics, apps programming, computer networks, animation, web- design, and many more. Classes at ECALC are designed to help students develop 21st Century Skills for College and Careers.

ECALC allows students to take advanced classes while staying enrolled in their high school where they can continue to partici-

pate in clubs, activities, and athletics. Students need to attend ECALC for a minimum of two periods either in the morning or afternoon, A or B day (e.g., A1, A2 or A3, A4). This helps eliminate students trying to travel between schools during class breaks and arriving late for their next class. Students are not limited to two periods but can take as many classes as they wish in two period blocks.

Take some time and view the ECALC website and see the great opportunities that are available to students as they prepare for college and careers. School counselors have begun the enrollment process for next year. If teachers have



students that are interested in ECALC, have students contact the school counselor.
