Superintendent's Message Come Join Us (unity and service)







NEBO SCHOOL DISTRICT'S SPECIAL POINTS OF INTEREST:

- Nebo District has over 31,000 students 2013-2014.

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Nebo's theme this year is "Come Join Us". This brings two interrelated words to mind: "unity and service". The theme began with the Superintendent's welcome back letter on Utah's pioneer heritage. These settlers exemplified "Come Join Us" (unity and service) perhaps more than any other group in history.

Superintendent Nielsen told three inspiring stories illustrating this theme that included the Lars Madsen story of the Hodgett Wagon Company, Josephine Catherine Chatterley Wood of San Juan County, and his own pioneering story in Nebo School District.

Superintendent Nielsen said, "I was hired as principal of Westside School and was desperate for "rescuers" and "angels of mercy." Thankfully the staff was committed to kids and knew that our collective success was best for all. We worked together, laughed together, grew together. We became family. A short two years later, on a Tuesday in September, I was asked to accept a new assignment at Art City Elementary beginning in just two days. I didn't ask to go. I didn't want to go. My farewell visit that Thursday morning was difficult to say the least.

"The Art City staff quickly welcomed me as a member of their family. Like their Westside counterparts, they too were "rescuers" and "angels of mercy" during a hard transition. I experienced this again at Rees Elementary and finally in my assignments here at the district office. Through these experiences I personally learned that the pioneer spirit is alive and well in Nebo District."

The Superintendent summarized these stories with the following: "As we go about our daily journey this year, I invite each of us to continue to honor our pioneer heritage by following their examples of 'unity and service'.

When we see coworkers, friends, family, and students along the trail who are literally and figuratively: haggard and worn, dragging, overloaded – with assistance seemingly unavailable in time of need, please recognize that we, and they, may be snowbound, starved and weary.

And even though we may be 'green as a cucumber,' deeply afraid, and asked to leave our comfortable home: Let us take them into our wagons, knowing the extra load will be a heavy burden, and perhaps slow our own progress.

So that it can be said of each of us, as it was with San Juan's Angel of Mercy: She was always glad to see me, interested in my problems, joys and sorrows. When she entered, all fear left; and I knew everything would be all right. Her tender touch, encouraging words, calm spirit, and cheerful way were many times the only medicine needed. . .

To know her was to love her."

The Superintendent emphasized, "I invite each of us to continue to honor our pioneer heritage by following their examples of "unity and service".

Thank you for what you do for each other and for students. I feel privileged to have been able to "Come Join" with you in this most important and noble work. Have a wonderful school year!"

Assistant Superintendent Scott Wilson introduced, Francis Christensen, and said, "Hundreds of adult education students graduated because of his leadership style of caring and concern. He loved teaching English and has several philosophies about it including: make it fun, the student is more important than the program, and treat students the way you would your own child. Students love Mr. Christensen because he truly cared."

Andrew Goudy

Principal Chad Argyle stated, "Andrew Goudy is the George Bailey of Santaquin Elementary. Here are a few reasons why: He is the first person teachers ask to read a Dr. Seuss book to their class. When a new teacher was hired, the first thing Mr. Goudy did was run home and find some bulletin borders and other posters to place in the room. I have been amazed how Mr. Goudy can maintain the building and grounds so well, when he never passes a child or an adult in the building without stopping to give them 100 percent of his attention. Mr. Goudy pays attention to details and after a very short visit will make a connection to family, town, or just simply the human soul. Like George Bailey, Mr. Goudy is truly the richest man in town."



Phil Bird

Elementary Director, Julie Warren, said, "Mr. Bird dedicated his life to the service of Nebo School District and to his community, making positive impacts on literally hundreds of people. He served as Social Science teacher, coach, assistant principal, principal, secondary education coordinator and human resource director. Mr. Bird is known as one of the best to ever teach at Springville. As a basketball coach and teacher, he taught life's lessons with a strong moral code. Students always knew the difference between right and wrong with Mr. Bird. As an administrator, Mr. Bird always asked others opinions and made everyone feel that their ideas were important to him. Mr. Bird is known as the perfect teacher because he is always teaching and helping people in everything he does."

Energy Conservation Program

The goal of the energy specialists and Nebo School District is to conserve energy where possible while still maintaining the comfort of employees and students.

Celebrations

Preventative maintenance was performed in every building in the district. This maintenance includes filter changes, fan and coils cleaned, freezer leaks fixed, and summer shutdowns. Two of our schools used 64,400 kilowatt hours and 94,000 kilowatts hours compared to last year 190,000 and 214,000 kilowatt hours. Energy reduction by 50% for the summer!

The energy specialists were able to find and fix equipment that has not worked for years. Here are just a few examples: The team found a rubber plug in an airconditioning line on a rooftop. The team fixed eight fan coil motors that had not been



working in just one school. The team also found insulation that had fallen over the heating-cooling vents in the ceiling which stopped air from flowing.

The energy specialists worked with cities on utilities and found thousands of dollars to save due to meters not working properly.

All custodians were trained on the controls of their building so they can adjust and diagnosis problems. Support and understanding from employees has been greatly appreciated.

There have also been a few challenges.

Challenges

The energy specialists have found old equipment that is not efficient and when the new equipment was installed, it was not working properly. The team changed many old controls because the industry does not support them. However, there were issues with new controls not working properly.

The team has heard complaints from teachers that their rooms are too hot. The district standard is from 74-78 degrees. We have set the controls at 74 degrees. Some will remember that fifteen years ago, the average class temperature at this time of year was in the high 80 and 90 degrees.

Since that time, the district included swamp coolers, then chillers to our buildings. Nebo has come a long way in the past fifteen



years. The energy team will continue to work on problematic rooms and areas in schools and buildings.

Just a bit of advice and caution

When employees bring and turn on fans, the fans then give a false reading to the controls. Many times this can make the room more warm.




