## Thinking of retiring at the end of 2020-21?

Nebo is offering an Early Retirement Notice incentive to those who have their retirement approved by the Board of Education before mid-February. The details are as follows:

- Any employee who is eligible for and retires from Utah Retirement System (URS) by June 30, 2021, can submit the final paperwork to the District by:
  - $\Diamond$ January 8, 2021, to receive \$1,000 in their January 31 paycheck, or
  - February 5, 2021, to receive \$500 in their February 29 paycheck.

This incentive is a one-time option for those who will retire at the end of the 2020-2021 school year. If you have any questions contact Troy Bohling at 801-354-7480.

# **COVID-19 Testing Opportunities**

The Utah Department of Health is offering free COVID-19 rapid antigen testing in communities across the state.

Anyone can get tested at these free testing clinics, even if they do not have symptoms of COVID-19.
