

Thinking of retiring at the end of 2018-19?

With the Early Retirement Incentive Plans, we recognize that many of our outstanding employees will be contemplating retirement at the end of this school year. We will be sad to see these good friends and dedicated coworkers leave our ranks and are so appreciative of their service to students.

In order to find the best possible candidates for open positions in the current competitive job market, it is important for supervisors to begin hiring new employees as soon as possible. Therefore, we are once again offering an Early Retirement Notice Incentive to those who have their retirement approved by the Board of Education before mid-February. The details are as follows:

- Any employee who is eligible for and retires from Utah Retirement System (URS) by June 30, 2019, can submit the final paperwork to the District by:
 - November 2, 2018, to receive \$1,000 in their November 30 paycheck, or
 - December 7, 2018, to receive \$1,000 in their December 31 paycheck, or
 - ♦ January 4, 2019, to receive \$1,000 in their January 31 paycheck, or
 - ♦ February 1, 2019, to receive \$500 in their February 28 paycheck.
- ◆ The final application deadline for this Early Retirement Notice Incentive is February 1, 2019.

This incentive is a one-time option for those who will retire at the end of the 2018-2019 school year. Interested employees who will be retirement eligible and would like to learn more about this option and their individual benefits may schedule an appointment with Robert Fleming at 801-354-7414. Retirement eligible employees will be given first priority for appointments.

A representative from Utah Retirement Systems will present basic retirement information for all employees on Wednesday, November 7, at 4:00 p.m. in the Nebo District office boardroom. Employees who would like to learn more about their retirement benefits are encouraged to attend.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS regarding the 2018 NEBO SCHOOL DISTRICT BOND PROPOSAL

- 1. What is a bond? Bond funds are for construction of new buildings, renovation and refurbishing of existing facilities, and purchasing property. General obligation bonds carry the lowest possible interest rates and are the least costly form of financing available. Authorization from the voting public is required before the District may issue bonds. State law states that bond funds cannot be used for salaries.
- Why does Nebo School District need to bond? Nebo continues to grow by approximately 500 students each year. Bond money is used to build new schools and make improvements to existing schools.
- 3. What options does Nebo have available to address growth? In order to accommodate a rapidly increasing student population, Nebo School District has three options. It can bond and build new schools, it can bring in portable classrooms, or it can increase class size. Nebo School District prefers to bond and build new schools as a long-term solution to address growth and as a potential way to reduce class size.
- 4. Will the bond increase my property tax rate? Current projections show that Nebo School District can bond without increasing property tax rates. Homeowner's property taxes will remain the same, provided that Utah County does not change the assessed value of their home.
- 5. Why does one part of the ballot say "property tax increase," and another say "no tax rate increase"? Some people believe that if taxes could go down and do not, then it should be considered a tax increase. Nebo School District's new debt obligation will not require a tax rate increase for the bond. However, the number of years of the debt obligation will be lengthened.
- 6. How can Nebo bond for \$298 million with no tax rate increase? With growth, more taxpayers share the responsibility for payment and existing bonds have been deliberately structured to allow new bonds to be issued without a tax rate increase. Nebo School District also qualifies for lower borrowing rates due to their AAA rating that is comparable to a personal credit score of 850. It is also important to understand that the money will be borrowed in smaller amounts (not all at once) over a number of years until the building projects are complete.
- 7. What will the bond money be used for? Recent public surveys have informed Nebo School District that the majority of parents are extremely interested in creating middle schools and rebuilding the older high schools. Therefore, Nebo School District is proposing to build three new middle schools and rebuild Payson High, Spanish Fork High, and Springville High. The new middle schools will be located within the boundaries of Springville High, Maple Mountain High, and Salem Hills High.
- 8. What are the benefits of building middle schools? Along with academic and social reasons, Nebo students can have a "straight alignment pattern" in their secondary schools. A "straight alignment pattern" means that all students in a middle school will go to the same junior high school and then to the same high school. In other words, the middle school and junior high boundaries are the same as the high school boundary.
- 9. Why do we need to rebuild the older high schools? Payson High, Spanish Fork High, and Springville High School will all be over 60 years old when/if they are rebuilt. They are currently in constant need of costly repair. When the schools are rebuilt, the need for portables will be greatly reduced. The new schools would be adaptable and ready for technology-based learning, while also having increased security measures and modern security systems. New schools are also built to current seismic standards, reducing risk to anyone that enters the buildings. All of these benefits help Nebo School District prepare for the future by addressing the academic and safety needs of students and staff.
- 10. What is the timeline for construction of the schools? If the bond passes, the district will begin construction of the first new middle school in the Spring of 2019. The last high school will be completed by the Fall of 2026.
