#### **Unleash your Imagination**

Many years ago, an important mentor gave me a book titled "Orbiting the Giant Hairball." It is written by a Hallmark Cards employee who "shares lessons on awakening and fostering creative genius." A key lesson taught is that "Our creative genius is the fountainhead of originality. It fires our compulsion to evolve. It inspires us to challenge norms. Creative genius is about flying to new heights on untested wings. It is about the danger of crashing. It is amorphous, magical, unmeasurable and unpredictable" (Orbiting the Giant Hairball, p. 22).

The education community has definitely flown to "new heights on untested wings" during the past year! So where will we go from here? One writer sets an important path forward: "Creativity is the novel step of being the first to identify that something might be possible in the first place. But innovation is the action of putting things into practical reality, despite challenges and resistance, rather than just contemplating" (Business News Daily Editor).

A recipe for successfully following this path of transforming creativity into innovation is outlined in the following principles from Pat Williams' book, "How to be Like Walt:"

- Draw on all of your life experiences. Everything that has ever happened to you is grist for the mill of your imagination. Don't waste your experiences. Remember them, reflect on them, and let them inspire you.
- Remove the limits from your imagination. Most of our limitations are actually self-imposed. We limit ourselves by worrying about the 'right' or 'proper' way to do things. The moment we place limits on imagination, creativity shuts down.

- Consider all possible solutions to every problem. Creative people look at problems and challenges from every angle. They don't want one solution. They want hundreds.
- Silence your inner critic. We all have a little voice inside us that criticizes our ideas and inhibits our creativity. Creative people learn to shut off that critical voice so they can explore the outer limits of their imagination.
- 5. To be creative, be courageous. Walt Disney was a dreamer, but he was so much more, because he dared to risk everything to make his dreams come true. So-called 'experts' called Disneyland 'Disney's Folly,' but it turned out that the real folly lay in ridiculing Walt's wonderful ideas.
- Work hard. Authentic creativity doesn't just dream; it builds. Some people are dreamers; others are builders. We need people today who have the vision to dream, plus the skills and the energy to pull it off and make the dreams come true.
- 7. **Ask yourself, 'What if . . .?'** Creative people don't say, 'I always do it this way.' They question assumptions and ask 'What if we could find a better way?' (How to be Like Walt, p. 64-71).

Thank you for your creativity and innovation this past year and your commitment to applying it to our "practical reality" moving forward into the future. Your focus helps Nebo District to *Be the*

#### Thinking of retiring at the end of 2020-21?

Nebo is offering an Early Retirement Notice incentive to those who have their retirement approved by the Board of Education before mid-February. The details are as follows:

- Any employee who is eligible for and retires from Utah Retirement System (URS) by June 30,
   2021, can submit the final paperwork to the District by:
  - February 5, 2021, to receive \$500 in their February 29 paycheck.
- The final application deadline for this Early Retirement Notice Incentive is February 5, 2021.
