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Superintendent's Message A Calling to "The Climb"

"Teachers are some of the only people on the planet who go to bed worrying about other people's children."¹

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"Teachers are driven by a passion to help others to become the best versions of themselves. We show up each day because we play a key role in someone's journey. While we may only play a part for a brief chapter, we seek to cultivate relationships to help our students recognize their greatness. Teachers respect diverse talents and ways to discovery. Teachers are more than cheerleaders; we are coaches. We celebrate the wins and learn from the losses."

"We teach because it is a part of us. A success story of one child will look exponentially different than another because no two students, even in the same classroom, should be viewed the same. The greatest impact we can have on a child is their identifying within themselves that they are capable. 'One afternoon I was planting ... lovely violet flowers. Suddenly I heard Virginia's voice calling to me from the sitting room window: "Hitler is making a speech." I shouted back, **"I shan't come. I'm planting iris and they will be flowering long after he is dead."** Last March, twenty-one years after Hitler committed suicide in the bunker, a few of those violet flowers still flowered under the apple-tree in the orchard.'

"Even when it's hard - or especially when it's hard - we must find times and moments and reasons to enjoy this great profession because these are the days that we'll look back on, and our students will email or write us about. These are the defining moments of our lives. How we choose to live them will determine how we remember them.

"What keeps you going as an educator? What encourages you?"

"Hope, joy, and irises. Because teaching is not a job, it's a calling."³
